Real Estate Corner – Four Deadly Selling Sins

As kids head back to school, leaves change and we feel the first chill in the air - the fall real estate market begins. We tend to see an increase in inventory/listings as summer draws to an end. Things to consider - and sins to avoid - if you're thinking about selling this fall.

Preparation. Getting your home ready by improving its curb appeal, addressing honey-do lists, making necessary repairs, and cleaning up are paramount in preparing for market. Just as important: your most valuable asset is square footage and it shouldn't be covered with stuff. You're going to be moving so take advantage of the opportunity to get ready for your move. Depersonalize. Declutter. Deep clean. Consider washing the windows and letting the light in, it makes a difference.

Seller fatigue. After completing all the preparation to list a home, it's natural to begin tiring of the process before the marketing even begins. Patience is needed. It took time to get the house ready for sale, and it will take time to sell it - regardless of media hype about how quickly everything is selling in Arlington. It's easy for seller fatigue to set in... to become impatient with showings and the need to keep things clean and tidy. But it's important for buyers to see the property in its best light.

Access. Most buyers begin their search online, before even talking to a real estate agent to help them in their search. Buyers also say they don't want to bother their agent, even if they have one, so will visit open houses and then call their agent about making an offer. This underscores the value of conducting open houses. And allowing showings for a second, or even third, look could mean the difference between receiving an offer and no offer materializing. Buyers sometimes need to spend time in a space to see themselves living in it.

Professionals. Finally, speak to a professional real estate agent about the value of your home, timing of your sale, the current market conditions, and pricing of properties in the neighborhood. An agent can also provide guidance on preparing your home and property for sale, repairs and/or renovations to consider, and staging (and what that entails) - as well as recommendations on trusted contractors to use.
