LVCA Meeting, May 13 8pm, Community House

Meet the Director of the Clarendon Alliance. For the first part of our program, we have invited Elizabeth Crocker, the new Executive Director of the Clarendon Alliance. She is seeking input from Lyon Village neighbors about what you like about Clarendon and about the types of events, such as pop-up markets, that will bring you up to Clarendon. Elizabeth is an Arlington native and knows Arlington well. The Clarendon Alliance is a non-profit, public-private partnership with Arlington County and partly funded by the county. Three Lyon Village residents serve on its 15-member volunteer board: Bill Gearhart, representing Lyon Village; and Tom Moriarity and Bill Trahant, appointed by the Arlington County Board. Unlike similar organizations in Ballston and Rosslyn, the Clarendon Alliance is not a BID (business improvement district) funded by a local business taxing district.

Real Estate Corner – Know Your Value

For this inaugural post, we are providing a recap of the Annual Real Estate Update given at the April LVCA General Meeting. This Real Estate Corner post will become a monthly feature in the *Bulletin*, and Lyon Village residents can send us questions to the email provided below.

Neighbors gathered for a lively discussion over wine and cheese, to talk about the current real estate market and its impact on Lyon Village. A primary focus of the meeting was Knowing Your Value. In society, we stress the importance of knowing our own personal value, but equally important is understanding the value of our greatest asset the home in which we live. The secret market for homes and lots in the neighborhood, when homes are sold offmarket without broad exposure, can hurt a seller.

We are currently in a strong sellers' market, with historically low inventory, so it's in the best interest of all sellers/owners to understand the value of what they own. Selling silently can be the path some choose, but homeowner should ensure they are getting market value for their home if they do so. The tax assessment isn't the market value! The market value is what a buyer will pay.

Of paramount importance is talking to someone to ensure you know your value! There are many professional agents in the neighborhood who can assist those considering a sale or who are approached by someone with an unsolicited offer to sell. Friends and neighbors can be engaged in a discussion about the possible paths available. As Billy noted in the meeting, it's even worth sticking a 'for sale by owner' in your yard to ensure you are getting the maximum exposure (and maximum amount) for your property.

Our friends and neighbors shouldn't settle for anything less than what they're worth!
