Anyone registered for the yard sale will have automatic direct pickup of leftover items on Saturday, Sept. 29 from 1-3pm by the National Children's Center. Anyone who has items that have not sold on yard sale day may bag them up and deposit them in front of your garage or visible place with a sign marked "NCC." All items must be bagged or boxed and clearly marked for NCC or they will not be picked up. If you have participated in the yard sale, but prefer not to donate your leftover items, contact Caroline Holt in advance; plus, NCC will not stop unless they see items marked "NCC." Noisy Work Hours

Please be aware that the county limits the hours during which noisy work can be performed, from 7am-9pm weekdays and 10am-9pm weekends and holidays. These hours apply to all work that makes noise, not just major construction projects. Noisy work includes lawn work, home repairs, etc., whether it's being done by a contractor or the homeowner. It is each homeowner's responsibility to ensure that workers in your employ understand and adhere to these hours.

On weekdays, you may contact the Code Enforcement Office at 703-228-3232 to report a violation. On weekends and holidays, you may call the Police Non-Emergency number, 703-558-2222, and an officer will be dispatched to the site.

Development Roundup

The developer of the townhouses at Lee Highway and Veitch St. reports that August was an exciting month for Evergreene Homes at The Court at Lyon Village. The first six-unit building has settled, and new neighbors are moving in. There are only three homes remaining. Construction of the last building has begun, with completion anticipated by the end of the year. Its townhomes were recently nominated for a prestigious GALA (Greater American Living Award) for Design and Architecture, sponsored by the Maryland and Northern Virginia Builder Industry Associations. Winners will be announced in late September.

Reporting Power Outages

As the power outage in early July showed, the power grid in Lyon Village is difficult to understand. We learned that the neighborhood is powered in sections and that homes on the same street may be in different sections. It is imperative that everyone who is experiencing a power outage contacts Dominion Power. Don't assume that just because your neighbor called that is sufficient; he/she may be in a different section, plus more calls tell Dominion that it's a widespread problem and not an isolated incident involving a single home.
