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Discussion on Historic Designation Part II

At last month's General Meeting, the neighborhood discussed some of the issues that enacting local Historic Designation for Lyon Village would entail, including means to encourage preservation of the overall appearance of our community. Our neighbor Bill Gearhart ably led this interesting discussion. Continuing this topic at our General Meeting this month, we have invited Michael Leventhal, the County's Historic Affairs Coordinator, to provide an overview of the County, State and Federal Historic Designation programs.

Most of Lyon Village has been designated by the state of Virginia as a Historic District, and our neighborhood is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. These designations provides no legal means for preventing the destruction or radical alteration of homes that are contributing structures to the neighborhood's historic designations. Mr. Leventhal will talk to us about the County's program for local historic designation and the range of choices available. This is an important presentation about the options that are available, including enacting means to preserve the homes and the character of streets in Lyon Village. The Association has never taken a position on historic designation.

A historic preservation overlay for portions of Lyon Village would have to be considered very carefully. Many at the April Meeting expressed grave concern at the number of teardowns that are changing the character of some of our streets. Standard home sizes are larger than they were in the period when most of Lyon Village was developed, and some feel that the newer homes are not always sympathetic to existing neighboring homes.

On the other hand, there are those in the neighborhood who would have serious concerns about too much limitation on what could be done to make maximum use of a property. There is a balance that can be reached to address property value concerns with streetscape preservation. Many communities have historic covenants that seem to work well for almost everyone; the models are out there and may require research beyond what has been pursued in Arlington County. Maywood is the only neighborhood in Arlington with historic covenants protecting the exterior appearance of homes.

Issues of siding, window types, roofing materials, and more are generally specified for renovations in neighborhoods with historic covenants.

Come out to the meeting to learn more about these issues and help decide where we go from here.

Last Chance to Check Out Your Listing in the 2009 Lyon Village Directory Before it Goes to Print!

The 2005 Lyon Village Directory has been updated and is online at www.lyonvillage.org. Please review your listing along with your neighbor's listings and send additions and changes to directory@lyonvillage.org as soon as possible. The online version will be updated and published based on corrections received by the end of May. As seen in the Introduction to the Directory, periodic revisions will be made to the online version until the next printed version is published. This means that if you want your correct information in the published version, it must be fixed now or wait several years!

If you are concerned about your information being available via the Lyon Village website, please consider:

- Most of the information in the Directory is easily found on the internet in a variety of sources, such as <u>whitepages.com</u> and the Arlington County website. Unlisted phone numbers that were provided recently or were published in previous versions of the Directory are a possible exception.
- It is easy to mitigate concerns about making your email address public. The solution is to simply create an address that you are comfortable with using more publicly. Many folks maintain multiple addresses for varying degrees of privacy. It costs nothing to maintain additional email addresses at one of the many free sites online, such as Google, Yahoo, Hotmail, AOL, etc. This is particularly useful for people who don't want excess personal mail at their work email address.
- The Directory is somewhat buried in the Lyon Village website, and because it is a PDF, it cannot be searched until it is found and then opened.

The directory offers important contact information for neighbors, especially in an emergency. If you prefer not to be listed, your listing will be removed in the alphabetical section, as well as your personal information in the street listing section.

Lyon Village Property Overview

The Lyon Village Directory (see previous page) is created from the Arlington County listings of all properties within the boundaries of Lyon Village (Lee to Wilson and Kirkwood/Washington Boulevard to Veitch). Here are some insights about Lyon Village gained from updating the database:

- Residential properties include: 777 single-family detached homes, 10 duplexes, 69 townhouses, 10 garden apartments, and several high-rise apartment/condo buildings. About 17 single-family homes and 1 duplex on Adams, Wayne, Veitch and Lee Highway are on property zoned RA8-18, which can have small apartment buildings or townhouses if enough property is consolidated.
- Commercial properties include three high-rise office buildings along Wilson Blvd, along with many properties along Wilson Blvd, Washington Blvd, and Lee Highway zoned C-2 or C-3 that have small buildings or parking lots that could be replaced by something much bigger.
- About 125 of the single-family homes are not occupied by the property owner. Several Lyon Village residents own additional homes in Lyon Village, which they rent.
- Property ownership records indicate that developers, partnerships, and limited liability corporations have bought clusters of single-family home properties in various part of Lyon Village: on Franklin, Lee, Veitch, Wayne, and 16th Street.
- R-5 zoning currently requires a minimum lot size of 5,000 square feet and R-6 zoning currently requires a minimum lot size of 6,000 square feet. This was not the rule when many Lyon Village homes were built on R-5 and R-6 lots. Seven R-5 lots and 216 R-6 lots do not have the minimum lot size. 48 R-6 lots have less than 5,000 square feet and 168 have between 5,000 and 6,000 square feet.
- One R-5 lot and 16 R-6 lots have more than double the minimum size and might be eligible to be subdivided into two lots, provided they have the required street frontage.
- Two churches (Clarendon Presbyterian and Community United Methodist) and the Lyon Village Community House occupy property zoned R-6.

Sand Storage Status on Kirkwood Road

As many may have noticed while driving by on Kirkwood Rd, the green area in the 1600 block of Kirkwood Rd has contained a large amount of tarp-covered sand stored there for the past year or so. This area, in back of Science Focus School, received the special sand in preparation for removal to the county's water treatment facility in South Arlington. This has been something of an eyesore in what is generally one of the greener portions of Kirkwood Rd. With all the construction for the underground power conduit on Kirkwood this issue has been less noticeable lately.

Mr. Loar, from the county's Department of Environmental Services has informed the neighborhood that current sand deliveries are now being made directly to the water treatment facility. While the facility is not completed, it is getting closer. It must be operational by the end of the year per the county's agreement with the state. The county plans to start moving the sand from Kirkwood Rd area to the facility in the coming weeks, though it may take 4-6 months to complete that process. The School Board granted the county use of this land for sand storage until the end of this year. The county in return agreed to restore the area to pre-storage conditions. Mr. Loar has no plans to seek an extension of the storage time and does have a plan to restore the area. After the sand is removed, the county will replace the trees that were killed by failing to maintain the proper safe areas. They will also lay seed. This would likely occur next spring. Due to the trunk lines for the pump station which run underground on the north side of the park, no deep tree roots can be tolerated.

The county is continuing to pursue permanent transfer of the school property to the county. This transfer was initiated 20 years ago but not consummated. The property is being used to house and service a pump station and is maintained by the county, not the schools. There is concern that if the school board cedes control of the land to the county, the county may continue to use the land as a convenient dumping ground. While it is unlikely that any structures would be built do to the necessity to keep the area above the pipe lines unimpeded, the kind of unsightly and disruptive storage we have witnessed with the sand is possible. At one point, the county was considering using the area as a recycling center. This would have led to the paving of a large portion of the area and the location unsightly waste storage containers. The county rescinded this concept after brief consideration.

School representative, Steve Larson, slarson@arlington.k12,va.us, has offered to keep the community apprised of the consideration by the School Board and county of such a property transfer. Mr. Larson noted that in the 1980s, a prior School Board had approved the transfer and thus the likelihood of it occurring would be impacted

According to Mr. Loar, from the schools essentially already transferred the property 20 years ago, but there was some final paperwork remaining unsigned. Persons wishing to maintain the area under the control of the School Board are advised to contact individual School Board members. In addition to other members, Abby Raphael (air3018@comcast.net) who has a child at the school and was ASFS president when the sand storage was approved in 2006, and Ed Fendley (202-647-2764), are well apprised of the situation.
